Duncan, Oklahoma, a small oil processing town in South Central Oklahoma, had two famous residents. First was Ron Howard, who would go on to play “Opie” on the widely-acclaimed “Andy Griffith Show.” The second was Lorenzo Dunford. The latter, however, would not become famous until much later in life when three accomplished musicians decided that their band should bear Dunford’s name. Similar to the famous 70’s group Lynnard Skinnard, who named its band after their high school teacher, members of the Lorenzo Dunford Band were so impressed with Lorenzo’s musical accomplishments that they felt he alone deserved the honor.
